COUNCILLOR REPRESENTATIVE REPORT ON ATTENDANCE AT: Alliance of Western Councils Board Meeting - Gilgandra

COUNCILLOR: Mayor Ewen Jones

DATES ATTENDED: 25 July 2025

1. Main Purpose of Meeting

The Mayor is Council's representative on the Alliance of the Western Councils Board.

2. Key Messages/Highlights of Relevance to Council

Presentation - Clare Pearson - CEO Little Wings

- Little Wings has been operating for 13 years, with Medical Wings operating for 5 years.
- The Pilots, who are commercial pilots, volunteer their time.
- Little Wings is 90% operated by volunteer nurses etc.
- The Doctors who fly out bulk bill
- Instead of families needing to go to Sydney to see a pediatrician or other specialist, Little Wings fly them to regional and remote NSW towns.
- Little Wings has 175 clinicians, including 13 Pediatricians, and travel an average of 120,250 kms and help out 3,255 families every year.
- Each flight costs an average of \$1,500.
- The total cost for each location for 12 visits is \$18K per year, for each town they visit.
- Little Wings own 4 Baron aircraft, and 1 Navaho aircraft.
- 30% of patients are first nations peoples.
- Little Wings has created an 85% reduction, 8,000 less beds being needed at John Hunter Hospital in Newcastle.
- An extra 1,000 children have become engaged with Little Wings, most of whom have never seen a doctor.
- Little Wings already fly a Psychiatrist to the NHS "Hub", who also bulk bills.
- Little Wings will send a package, explaining what funding they would like to achieve.
- It was discussed that local businesses might consider contributing. This would be fully tax deductible.
- The Little Wings concept is a great step towards Closing the Gap.

Presentation - Glen Colley Manager Local Water Utility Reform DCCEEW

- Local Councils are responsible for looking after town water. This includes regular testing under the LG Act 1993, section 8A(2)(e).
- The State Government continues to provide funding to Local Government for water operations.

- Focusing on 16 Remote and Very Remote NSW LGA's, plus 4 Alliance Councils Narromine, Dubbo, Gilgandra and Mid-Western.
- Process so far Consultation Oct-Nov 2024, Options Analysis Oct 2024 February 2025, Council Reference Group December 2024 – April 2025, Government Response pending.

What we have heard so far:

- Strong opposition to corporatisation, especially State based service delivery.
- Strong opposition to County Council model (especially separating water and sewer)
- Strong opposition to removing water and sewer staff from Councils (due to the potential impact on general purpose Council finances)
- Strong preference in exploring the Western Councils Water Alliance model.

Also:

- Structural change won't overcome the need for significant capital spending in very remote councils.
- No one size fits all approach.
- Distinct geographical split between Alliance Councils and those in the south-west and Namoi.
- Decision making can't be based only on economic analysis (need to consider local circumstances, impacts on councils, and maintain local decision making).
- There is a need to focus on strategic planning
- There is an opportunity to test the Alliance model.

A potential way forward:

It is proposed to co-design the western NSW councils in two phases, targeted water utility Strategic Planning Support and Capability Building Pilot Program, comprising of:

- Phase 1: Strategic Planning gap analysis for Western NSW councils (to roll out from late 2025 to mid-2026).
- Phase 2: A two-year, targeted support and capability building Program for the 20 councils, commencing 1 July 2026 (subject to approval funding from the NSW Government).

Delivery of Phase 2 will be via a combination of expert departmental staff, as well as in-regional staff **embedded within the Western Councils Alliance** to test the alliance model.

Note: Non-alliance Councils in western NSW will also be supported to address the gaps, but would not be subject to the embedded, Alliance support component.

How could the Alliance-based resource operate:

- Funding agreement between the department and the host Council (Mid-Western)
- Recruitment undertaken as a joint effort including the Alliance and the department.
- The Alliance would need to ensure appropriate governance and oversight is in place, to provide accountability to the department as the funding body.

 Through co-design (Alliance councils and the Department), the program would need to develop a prioritisation framework to ensure the work program considers the needs of all Alliance councils.

Presentation - Member for Dubbo Electorate - The Hon Dugald Saunders MP

Spoke about the impact of renewable energy:

- REZ New transmission lines, 3GWA 12 GWA four of these.
- Little to no consultation with landholders
- What will the legacy be Housing affordable/refuse use?
- Rating system for different renewable companies.
- Getting power to the grid could cause power failures from overloading lines,
- We need cheaper power for businesses
- TfNSW jobs being reduced
- Discovery passes available for the XPT to boost visitor numbers to regional NSW
- Coalition funding pledged is coming to an end start applying for new funding now.
- Dubbo Sports Hub funding debacle.
- REZ will Councils have sufficient water/sewer/housing, as well as the impact on hospitals and all emergency services.

RFS

- About 200 new Firefighting vehicles have been purchased
- \$27M being spent on fire mitigation working with other agencies to complete
- Hazard reduction using cultural history techniques for back burning
- Recruiting for paid RFS staff Fire Control Officers etc
- Vehicle annual inspections some are not being done locally being taken to Sydney on a truck carrier
- More sheds are needed to house RFS trucks

Presentation - Holly Davies - TfNSW

- Strategic Plan and Road Maintenance Western Region Update
- Parkes bypass complete and is open.
- New Dubbo Bridge is progressing well on time for completion in late 2026
- Narrabri to Moree road has new overtaking lanes completed
- Spring Creek 64 metre new bridge west of Narrabri is on track

Inland Rail – Narromine to Narrabri:

- Pre-delivery activities including geotechnical investigations
- In the last 3 months IRPL engineering team and field contractors completed most of their scope in the southern part of the Narromine to Narrabri section.
- All borrow pit geotechnical investigations are done and the IRPL will visit sites quarterly to monitor ground water levels.
- Utility investigations and built environment surveys have also been finalized
- Finally, autumn biodiversity surveys have wrapped up and the team is preparing for the winter surveying phase, (started 21 July 2025).
- The data from these investigations will help our engineers refine designs.

Road Maintenance Council Contract Update.

- There are currently 22 Council partners for the Road Maintenance Council contracts.
- The initial term of the current 3-year contract ends 30 June 2026.
- The western region allocation for 2025/26 across all programs of work applicable to RMCC is around \$140M. Contract Managers, Surveillance Officers and Council representatives are currently working through the Routine Maintenance Annual Plan (RMAP) approvals, and the confirmation of scope for ordered works program.
- TfNSW staff numbers are being cut between 300 900 mainly from the Executive level

Presentation - Gerry Collins - NSW Government update - Premiers Department

- Our reach spans across 6 regions North Coast, Hunter New England, Central Coast, Illawarra Southeast, Riverina Murray and Western NSW.
- Our staff live in the communities they serve, ensuring we are always connected and engaged with local issues and people.

In relation to Alliance of Western Councils:

- Feedback from the Western Community Strategic Planning Forum held 4 March 2025. AWC Strategic Plan Opportunities for joint work that can be considered by the Regional Leadership Group.
- Community Consultation Bill Rolling out sector training and toolkit, QA system and tracking in train issues that Councils have concerns about implementation.
- Western NSW Regional Leadership Group Priorities.
- Western Regional Coordination Team LGA's.

Western Regional Leadership Executive Priority Areas:

- Renewable Energy Transition
- Health Services
- Youth crime and social disadvantages
- Housing development and constraints
- Workforce shortages in critical sectors
