A general guide to what you can and can't do during the Bush Fire Danger Period and Total Fire Ban Days



Can I light an incinerator?

Can I carry out hot works such as welding, grinding, soldering or gas cutting?



Can I carry out harvesting operations? This includes driving or using machinery in any grass, crop or stubble land.



Can I light a camp fire in a NSW State Forest, National Park or Regional Park ?





Can I have a gas/electric BBQ in a NSW State Forest, National Park or Regional Park?





Can I light a fire in the open air for burning of grass, stubble, weeds, undergrowth and other excess vegetation?



Can I light an open fire in a residential area to burn leaves and other garden refuse?





Can I have a BBQ, light a camp fire or a fire for warmth & comfort?



Bush Fire Danger Period

Yes As long as:

- You have a current Permit to Burn issued by the NSW Rural Fire Service or NSW Fire and Rescue;
- The fire should be in a properly constructed incinerator that does not allow sparks or burning material to escape;
- There is at least a minimum 5m area clear of any combustible material around the incinerator;
- A person is in attendance at all times while the fire is alight;
- · A continuous supply of water is available on site;
- You contact your local council to understand if you need approval for smoke and air pollution.

Total Fire Ban

No

- Use of incinerators is banned on days of Total Fire Ban.
- This includes 44 gallon/200L drums or any other item used to burn material.

No

 No general purpose welding, grinding, soldering or gas cutting can be done in the open.

Note: In exceptional circumstances for essential services (such as public utilities) an exemption may be granted by the NSW RFS Commissioner.

Yes As long as:

- There is a 3m area clear of any combustible material around where you are working;
- You have adequate fire fighting equipment available onsite. You must have:

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- A minimum 16L knapsack spray pump filled with water or
- A minimum 9L liquid fire extinguisher or
- A minimum 0.9kg dry powder fire extinguisher.

Yes As long as:

- Any heated area of the machinery does not come in contact with combustible material;
- The machinery is in a good and serviceable condition;
- The machinery is fitted with an approved spark arrestor;
- You carry fire safety equipment in working order. You must have:
 - A minimum 16L knapsack spray pump filled with water or

There may be Solid Fuel Fire Ban in your local National Park or

Regional Park - you should check with your local National Park Office.

- A minimum 9L liquid fire extinguisher or
- A minimum 0.9kg dry powder fire extinguisher.

· There is a Solid Fuel Fire Ban in all State Forests.

No wood, heat beads or any other solid fuel can be lit.

Yes The same requirements as for Bush Fire Danger Period as well as:

- On days of **Severe** Fire Danger the RFS may request harvest operations stop during the heat of the day;
- On days of Extreme Fire Danger the RFS will request harvest operations stop during the heat of the day;
- On days of Catastrophic Fire Danger the RFS will strongly advise harvest operations stop.

You should also check with your insurance company to understand your policy.

No

 Campfires, fires for warmth or personal comfort and solid, gas or liquid fuel barbeques and ovens are all banned.

Yes A gas or electric BBQ is allowed as long as:

- You have a cleared area of at least 2m around the BBQ;
- You have an adequate water supply or a fire extinguisher;
- A responsible person is in attendance while the BBQ is alight.

Yes

- But only for gas or electric BBQs constructed by the NSW State Forests, National Parks or Regional Parks in a specified picnic area.
- You must check with the Parks or State Forest Office prior to using the BBQ.

Yes As long as:

- You have a current Permit to Burn issued by the NSW Rural Fire Service or NSW Fire and Rescue;
- You contact the NSW RFS to understand if you need a Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Certificate;
- You contact your local council to understand if you need approval for smoke and air pollution.

You have a current Permit to Burn issued by the NSW Rural Fire

You obtain appropriate approval from council for smoke and air

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- No fire is to be lit on days of Total Fire Ban.
- All permits are suspended on days of Total Fire Ban.
- All Hazard Reduction Certificates are suspended on days of Total Fire Ban.

- All permits are suspended on days of Total Fire Ban.

Yes As long as:

Yes As long as:

You have a cleared area of at least 2m;

Service or NSW Fire and Rescue;

- The fire is on private property;
- The fire and the fuel are the minimum required for the purpose;
- A responsible person is in attendance at all times until the fire is extinguished;
- The fire is fully extinguished before you leave the site;

The site is clear of all combustible material for 2m;

 You contact your local council to understand if you need approval for smoke and air pollution.

No

- No open fires are to be lit on days of Total Fire Ban.
- All permits are suspended on days of Total Fire Ban.

Yes But only a gas or electric BBQ can be used within 20m of your home as long as:

- You have a cleared area of at least 2m area around the BBQ;
- You have a continuous supply of water available with a hose;
- A responsible person is in attendance at all times while the BBQ is alight.
